The Poster Session, Speed Interviews and Networking program are open to all students for advancing their professionalism and career preparedness.

POSTER SESSION

Students and professionals are invited to submit Poster Session proposals on the SCCEC website. Each student must include a faculty advisor. All posters are presented at the same time for the 30minute session. Students, faculty, and district personnel will be encouraged to **COLLEGE**

come view the posters and ask presenters questions.

SPEED INTERVIEWS

The program is much like the concept of speed dating. Speed Interviewing is a simulated interviewing experience for students that provides them with an opportunity to interview with human resources/recruitment officers.

Undergraduate students circulate through 10–20 interviewers (professionals), spending about five

minutes per interviewer. Each interviewer will ask questions throughout the event. Interviewers remain seated at the interview tables and the students circulate from one interviewer to the next. The interviewer asks the student a question, listens for the answer, and provides feedback to the student. A bell sounds to signify when it is time for the student to move to the next interviewer.

NETWORKING

Students and interviewers are invited to remain after the interview portion of the event to enjoy light refreshments. Each college/university CEC organization will have their own table and will be asked to have a tri-fold poster or a computer presentation sharing information about their organization's programs, events, and activities.

Restorative Justice – Filling a Need in Our Schools

As the new principal of Aiken's Horse Creek Academy Public Charter School and an educator who has served in many different capacities all over South Carolina, I have seen a need for us to do something different as it relates to school discipline. According to the Adverse Childhood Experience Study, 1 in 5 children have a diagnosed major mental health disorder. Mental illness, particularly anxiety, is taking over our schools statewide. Our kids are struggling. Our kids are coming to school with trauma. Our kids are having a hard time coping. Our kids don't feel like they belong. We need to do something different.

At Horse Creek, we have listened to the needs of students, and we are handling discipline in a totally new way it's called restorative justice. What is restorative justice? Restorative justice is an alternative approach to school discipline that emphasizes bringing together those who have caused and experienced harm and providing all parties with equal attention. It is an approach based more on talking and listening than on delivering consequences. Restorative justice promotes the following: self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision making.

There are some "go to" questions we use when talking to students during the restorative justice approach: What happened? Whom did this affect and how? What do you need to do to make it right?

In the past, if a student stole something from another student or a student was disrespectful to a classmate or his/her teacher, they may have been sent to the Principal's office and possibly sent home for a day. Sending them home doesn't teach the "typical" student a lesson. In fact, in many cases sending a student home for the day rewards them. With restorative justice, the administrators meet with the student and the person that they stole from or disrespected. We ask them probing questions that get them thinking about the victim in their case and how the offender can make things right again.

So far this year, we have had more than 25 restorative conversations in our school, all of which has led to restored relationships and restored justice in our school community.

As educators, we are here to teach so that our students learn the content which we are delivering on a daily basis. Here at HCA, we are also here to love and respect children and honor what they bring to the table. We are here to create better humans. If, as adults, we all did a better job of restoring relationships and seeking to make things right, can you imagine how much better we would all be?

Dr. Ann Marie Taylor is the new Executive Director/Principal at Horse Creek Academy Public Charter in Aiken, SC. She has served as the South Carolina Teacher of the Year back in 2008 and has almost 20 years' experience in SC's public schools.
